Administrative Experiences and Accomplishments at SHSU

Director (Jan. 2023 – current; part-time), Center for Intelligence and Crime Analysis

Responsibilities

- Established and lead the Center with a focus on 1) delivering professional development courses to working professionals, 2) creating academic opportunities for SHSU students, and 3) providing technical assistance to agencies to allow them to deploy their resources more efficiently and effectively.
- Manage a budget of \$ 209,000.
- Supervise one full-time program coordinator and one graduate assistant.
- Collaborate with external and internal stakeholders.
- Assess professional development needs for analysts.
- Secure external sources of funding to ensure sustainability.

Accomplishments

- Delivered 10 professional development courses to more than 100 analysts between May and December, 2023.
- Collaborated with the Department of Environmental and Geosciences to create an undergraduate minor and a certificate in Crime Analysis and Mapping that was launched in fall 2023.
- Facilitated the establishment of crime analysis internship positions in the Harris County Sheriff's Office and the SHSU Police Department.
- Submitted a proposal for a federal earmark through Representative Pete Sessions Office, *East Texas Law Enforcement Training Project (Texas 17th Congressional District)*, \$ 1,136,985; currently being considered by the United States House of Representatives Appropriations Committee.

Department Chair (Aug. 2016 – Dec. 2022; part-time), Department of Criminal Justice and Criminology

Responsibilities

- Led academic programs that served a diverse group of 3,100 criminal justice majors (2,903 undergraduate students and 197 graduate students in fall 2022); demographic characteristics of student majors were 65% female, 36% Hispanic, 14% Black, and 2% Asian; largest demographic group of students was Hispanic females (n=799).
- Provided leadership for thirty-four tenure-track/tenured faculty members (as of fall 2022), one clinical assistant professor, two visiting assistant professors, and two professional staff.
- Directed B.A., B.S., M.A., two M.S., and Ph.D. academic programs; one M.S. program is offered on-line and the B.A. and B.S. programs are offered in person and on-line.
- Oversaw 180 to 190 course sections each semester; 19,852 semester credit hours each semester (fall 2022); 6,618 students enrolled in course sections each semester (fall 2022); 902 degrees conferred (AY 2021-2022).

- Collaborated with the assistant department chair to supervise 40 or more adjunct instructors each semester.
- Managed annual budgets for faculty travel (≈ \$53k annually), operations and management (≈ \$7,500 annually), adjunct instructors (≈ \$545k annually), graduate student stipends and scholarships (≈ \$825k annually), and departmental recovered indirect costs (≈ \$45k); recommend faculty merit (≈ \$75k annually); implement budgetary decisions to advance the department's objectives.
- Served on the College of Criminal Justice Academic Leadership Team.
- Prepared assessment reports and utilized results in decision making.
- Oversaw all academic program self-studies and external reviews.
- Provided professional development opportunities for faculty and staff.
- Collaborated with academic units across campus.

Accomplishments

- Advanced academic program success
 - Led the department's response to the COVID-19 pandemic.
 - Collaborated on the College of Criminal Justice efforts to enhance on-line course quality and expand reach to students outside of Texas.
 - Aided in creating the Department of Victim Studies in the College of Criminal Justice in 2019.
 - Ensured on-line courses were developed to offer 100% on-line B.A. and B.S. degrees in Criminal Justice; increased numbers of Victim Studies courses delivered on-line.
 - Directed the creation of a minor in Criminal Justice, Equity, and Inclusion.
 - Undertook the department's and SHSU's first undergraduate program self-study and external review.
 - Oversaw responses to external reviews of the M.S. On-Line, M.A., and Ph.D. academic programs.
 - Improved the department's Ph.D. program US News and World Report ranking by eight positions (ranked 15th in early 2022); ensured the M.S. on-line program consistently ranked in the top three by US News and World Report (ranked 2nd in early 2022).
- Developed the faculty
 - Increased the representation of Asian, Black, Latinx, and Middle Eastern tenure-track/tenured faculty from three to eleven (as of August 2022).
 - Secured seven assistant professor growth positions, one clinical assistant professor growth position, and one new post-doctoral fellow position for the department.
 - Hired eighteen tenure-track/tenured faculty members, one clinical assistant professor, two visiting assistant professors, and one post-doctoral fellow.
 - Managed the tenure and promotion process for three faculty members and promotion in rank process for three faculty members.
 - Established a formal mentoring program for early career faculty in the department.

 - Established and strengthened research partnerships with multiple criminal justice system agencies, including the Houston Police Department, Harris County Sheriff's Office, Montgomery County District Attorney's Office, Montgomery County Sheriff's Office, Texas Alcoholic and Beverage Commission, Texas Commission on Jail Standards, Texas Department of Criminal Justice, and U.S. Attorney's Office for the Southern District of Texas.
